



Lycoming County Economic Development Overview

Digger Specialties: Constructed a 160k SF facility in Brady Township to manufacture powder coated aluminum and plastic fenceproducts, with a projected employment of 150 by the end of 2023. (Source: Lycoming County Economic Development reports)

Chance Aluminum: Acquired the former JW Aluminum plant in Williamsport, employing over 80 people and building a 60k SF addition to create another 100 jobs within 18 months.

West Pharmaceuticals Williamsport Plant: Broke ground on a \$35m 10k SF addition, adding 50 jobs upon completion in 2023. (Source: Lycoming County Economic Development data)

West Pharmaceuticals Jersey Shore Plant: Expanded with new manufacturing equipment, hiring 100 employees in 2021. Announced a \$65m expansion in September 2022, adding another 40k SF and 150 new employees by Q2 2024.

The economy of Lycoming County, PA, is comprised of strong healthcare contributions from institutions like University of Pittsburgh Medical Center (UPMC), Susquehanna and Geisinger Muncy Hospital, along with diverse sectors such as manufacturing, education, and tourism, fostering a dynamic economic landscape.

Medical

- University of Pittsburgh Medical Center (UPMC)
 Susquehanna is a major economic force in Lycoming
 County, contributing over \$750 million annually to
 the county and the broader region, as per the
 Economic Benefit report from the Hospital & Health
 System Association of Pennsylvania.
- In 2016, UPMC Susquehanna committed \$500 million to enhance and develop services in the region over the next 5-7 years, underscoring its dedication to regional growth and advancement.
- As of September 2021, UPMC Susquehanna achieved accreditation as a Level II Trauma Center by the Pennsylvania Trauma Systems Foundation (PTSF), reaffirming its dedication to delivering exceptional care and services in north central Pennsylvania.
- Geisinger Hospital's expansion efforts resulted in the opening of a new Muncy hospital in December 2021, with steady growth in the workforce, increasing from just over 200 employees at the opening to over 250 as of September 2022.
- The healthcare sector's continuous progress and positive economic impact in the region are evident, with both UPMC Susquehanna and Geisinger Muncy significantly contributing to the overall growth and well-being of the communities they serve.

Tourism

- Tourism in Lycoming County, PA, has been a significant economic driver, generating substantial revenue and job opportunities in the region.
 According to a report by the Lycoming County Visitors Bureau, tourism contributed over \$300 million to the local economy in the past year, accounting for a significant portion of the county's GDP.
- International Little League serves as a major economic catalyst for Lycoming County and the surrounding region, infusing \$32 million annually into the local economy.
- • The Little League complex attracts a substantial number of visitors, with approximately 70,000 unique visitors flocking to the site each year.
- Lycoming County's reputation as a hunter's haven contributes to its thriving forest tourism sector. The region boasts numerous private hunting camps and offers diverse outdoor activities, including lumber heritage exploration, cross-country skiing, birdwatching, hiking, and equestrian pursuits.
- The county's natural beauty is further enhanced by miles of exceptional value (EV) and high-quality cold water fisheries (HQ-CWF) streams and watersheds, providing ample opportunities for recreational activities and attracting nature enthusiasts.

Education

Lycoming College

- Lycoming College significantly contributes to the county's economy, having invested over \$25 million in campus infrastructure since 2008
- With a workforce of 350+ full and part-time employees, Lycoming College serves as a prominent local employer.
- The college's operational budget of \$44 million and institutional endowment of \$220 million have a substantial annual economic impact, promoting local and regional investment.
- Lycoming College's involvement in the East End Gateway project signifies its commitment to community development, and it plans to construct a new campus entrance on Basin Street.

Pennsylvania College of Tech

- The Pennsylvania College of Technology plays a vital role as a substantial economic catalyst for Lycoming County, contributing an annual revenue of more than \$234 million.
- The college's influence on the local housing market is evident, with over 2,000 students residing in private rental housing within the county.
- Ongoing campus development projects have been substantial, with over \$250 million invested in construction endeavors since 1998. The college's dedication to workforce development is evident, with workforce enrollments surpassing 7,500 in 2017.
- The Plastics Innovation & Resource Center (PIRC) at the college plays a pivotal role in supporting the plastics industry's growth both domestically and internationally through training and technology resources.




Traffic Modeling: Volumes & Levels of Diversions

I-180 Corridor Impact fromCentral Susquehanna Valley Thruway (CSVT).

The opening of the northern section of CSVT in July 2022 led to increased traffic along the I-180 corridor, with projections indicating further changes upon the project's full completion in 2027.

The presence of substantial development near Muncy and The District at Lycoming Valley is foreseen to escalate traffic volumes at those interchanges and significantly increase traffic volume along Lycoming Mall Drive and North Main Street.
